





3 FREE AT LAST STATUE

Commemorates Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" speech. Legend has it the 50 doves will break free when world peace becomes reality.

4 HOWARD GOTLIEB ARCHIVAL RESEARCH CENTER

On the first floor of the George Sherman Union (GSU), the center rotates exhibits of its collection, including papers and works by Robert Frost, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and Theodore Roosevelt.

5 GSU FOOD COURT

Grab a coffee at Starbucks or a burger at Rhett's. Then, pick the brains of students to learn what they love most about BU.

6 GREEK ROCK

At BU Beach, where students gather on nice days. The Rock has more than 1,000 student-applied layers of paint and changes color daily during Greek Week.

8 BU BRIDGE

Walk out over the Charles River for spectacular views of Boston and the BU campus.

- Spring semester, Boston—a solid foundation of humanities, social sciences, and rhetoric
- Summer term in London—six weeks of intensive study
- Sophomore year in Boston—including electives in your field of interest
- Sophomore Capstone project with classmates researching a social issue and proposing specific policy solutions
- Junior year—transition to the BU school or college of your choice for your third and fourth years at BU




