David Oshinsky is a professor of history at NYU and director of the Division of Medical Humanities at NYU Langone Health, and the author of numerous books, including *Polio: An American Story*, which won the Pulitzer Prize in History; *Worse Than Slavery*, which was awarded the Robert Kennedy Prize for its distinguished contribution to human rights; and *Bellevue: Three Centuries of Medicine and Mayhem at America's Most Storied Hospital*, which was voted a "best Book of the Year" by NPR. His articles appear regularly in the *New York Times*, *The Wall Street Journal*, the *New York Review of Books*, and other publications.
