Yates' experience allowed her to travel to both Cambodia and Shanghai, where she took an internship supported by both the Benjamin Gilman Scholarship (an undergraduate grant from the U.S. State Department) and a Lehigh travel grant.

MAKING CONTACT
WITH HISTORY IN GHANA

KWAME ESSIEN

Kwame Essien grew up in Ghana just a few blocks from Elmina Castle, where African slaves were bought and sold before being transported to the colonies in the 17th and 18th centuries. Even still, he never really thought much about his family connections to the slave trade until he moved to the United States and saw the implications of slavery first-hand.

Now, as an assistant professor of history and Africana studies, Essien directs an ethnographic research program in Ghana that provides students with historical perspectives on slavery and opportunities to pursue their own research. Students visit sites involved in the slave trade like Elmina Castle, where they can walk the same paths that slaves took as they left Africa.

Iacocca International Internship Program

Founded in 2011 with a gift from automotive icon Lee Iacocca '45 and other donors, the Iacocca International Internship Program sends students to work or conduct research overseas each summer. Students are immersed in a new culture and get real-world professional experience. This program is fully funded and prioritizes students who have high financial need or have never been abroad before. Internships are available for students in all majors and many are provided by Lehigh alumni.

Carter Hartmann '18 spent eight weeks in Kyrgyzstan living with a host family and interning at a travel agency through Lehigh's acclaimed lacocca International Internship Program. During his time there, Hartmann helped Kyrgyz high school students planning to study in the United States prepare for their own international experience. Just as important, Hartmann was able to immerse himself in a culture very different than his own, experiencing Ramadan in a predominately Muslim country and celebrating iftar, the breaking of the daily fast, with his new friends abroad. He so enjoyed his experience in Kyrgyzstan that he's now considering working abroad after graduation in a similar capacity, educating young people about American culture and learning about their culture in return.



As part of her research into the dynamics of social exclusion, Christine Novak takes students to Prague each summer through the lacocca International Internship Program to work with established NGOs and improve conditions for minorities in the Czech Republic like the Roma people. This year, Novak expanded her work even further, overseeing a project through Lehigh's innovative Mountaintop Program that focused on improving education in minority communities in the United States and the Roma communities of Prague. Novak hopes students who work alongside her in Prague can take what they learn about social exclusion and apply it to their work—and their lives back at home.

A PASSION FOR INNOVATION

PHACHARAPOL 'TECH' TANASARNSOPAPORN

Passion for entrepreneurship comes naturally to Phacharapol 'Tech' Tanasarnsopaporn '19his family founded its own business in Thailand. So when Tech arrived at Lehigh, he dove right in.

As the engineering lead for Lehigh Hyperloop, Tech works with a team of Lehigh students competing in Space X's Hyperloop Pod Competition to build a vehicle for a potential high-speed ground transportation system. He's also involved in the CREATE Club, helped launch an expanded MakerSpace to give students access to the tools and materials needed to make their ideas real, and is helping co-organize the Lehigh Startup Expo, a showcase for local and national startups with internship opportunities for Lehigh students. Tanasarnsopaporn's goal is to fund his own start-up one day.

The **MakerSpace** is part of Lehigh's Design Labs and gives students access to tools and materials needed to make their ideas real.





His school closed, and Elalam eventually found himself working with a weapons counterproliferation unit that aimed to convince militia leaders and insurgents to stop the violence.



LEHIGH UNIVERSITY

Recognized among the nation's premier research universities, Lehigh University offers a rigorous academic program and dynamic campus environment for more than 7,000 students.

Founded in 1865 and located in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, a vibrant and historic community located a short drive from New York City and Philadelphia, the university has four colleges: the College of Arts and Sciences, the College of Business and Economics, the P.C. Rossin College of Engineering and Applied Science, and the College of Education. The university offers more than 100 undergraduate degree programs and 13 Master's and Doctorate-level programs.

Lehigh is home to nearly 700 faculty members, 64 percent of whom are tenured. Ninety-nine percent of tenure-track faculty hold a doctorate or the highest degree in their field. The university is renowned both for its wide-ranging interdisciplinary programs and for its commitment to providing research experiences for students. More than 1,000 Lehigh undergraduates take part in research each year, with dozens receiving grants in support of their own work.

Student life at Lehigh integrates academics with a vibrant array of organizations and activities, leadership development, residential life, the arts, exciting community service opportunities and a Division 1 athletics program. The university is home to more than 150 clubs, 43 intramural and club sports, and 31 fraternities and sororities.
