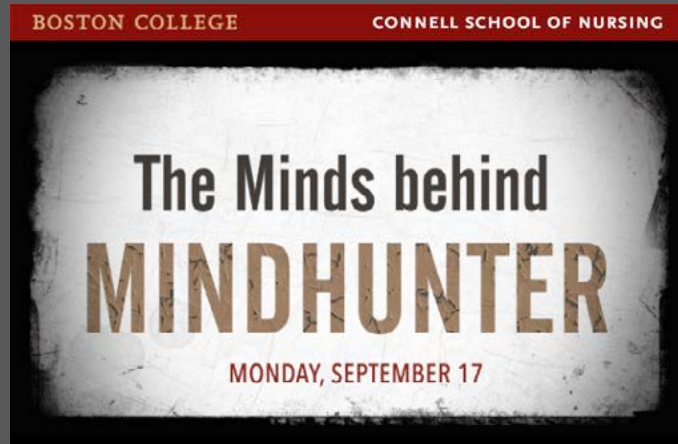

The Minds behind *Mindhunter*

A conversation with Professor Ann Burgess and John Douglas

In the late 1970s, Boston College Professor of Nursing Ann Burgess, a pioneer in assessing and treating trauma victims, and then-FBI special investigator John Douglas helped develop a new type of criminal profiling to better understand notorious serial killers. Their experiences were captured in *Mindhunter*, a 1995 book that became the basis for the fictionalized Netflix hit series. <p>Ann Wolbert Burgess</p> <p>Ann Wolbert Burgess, DNSc., AFRN, FAAN, is an internationally recognized pioneer in the assessment and treatment of victims of trauma and abuse. In the late 1970s, Burgess—already known for establishing one of the country's first hospital-based rape crisis counseling programs at Boston City Hospital—was invited to the FBI Academy, which was just forming its new criminal profiling unit. There, she worked with investigators, studying serial offenders, and learning to recognize patterns connecting evidence from sex crime scenes to perpetrators' intent.</p>  <p>Burgess went on to examine serial killers, sexual homicides, serial child molesters, and how victims become abusers. Hailed as a trailblazer in psychiatric mental health nursing, her life's work has led to the development of forensic nursing as a specialty. With Connell School Professor Emeritus Carol Hartman, Burgess studied the growth and development of very young trauma victims, their families, and communities. Her work continues in explorations of elder abuse in nursing homes, cyberstalking, and Internet sex crimes. She teaches courses in Victimology, Forensic Science, Forensic Mental Health, Case Studies in Forensics, and the Forensic Science Lab at Boston College.</p> <p>In the Netflix drama <i>Mindhunter</i>, the fictional crime victim expert Wendy Carr (Anna Torv) is a fictionalized character based on Burgess.</p>	<p>John Douglas</p> <p>In the late 1970s, FBI Special Agent John Douglas developed new investigative techniques to identify serial killers, rapists, child molesters, and other violent criminals. He used those methods to advance investigations to what is now known as criminal profiling.</p> <p>A U.S. Air Force veteran with a doctorate in education, Douglas employed profiling in numerous prominent cases, assessing such notorious criminals as the cult leader Charles Manson and David Berkowitz, better known as "Son of Sam." Douglas, Burgess, and Robert Resler used data from these studies in <i>Sexual Homicide: Patterns and Motives</i> (Free Press, 1993). With Allen Burgess, the three wrote the <i>Crime Classification Manual: A Standard System for Investigating and Classifying Violent Crime</i> (Jossey-Bass, 1992).</p> <p>Douglas, who retired from the FBI in 1995, has remained active as a speaker and co-author of books including <i>Mindhunter: Inside the FBI's Elite Serial Crime Unit</i> (Pocket, 1995) and <i>Journey</i></p>  <p>He was an independent investigator on the JonBenet Ramsey case and served as a consultant on films including <i>The Lovely Bones</i>. Douglas has been the basis for characters in books and films including <i>The Silence of the Lambs</i> (FBI agent Jack Crawford), and in the Netflix drama <i>Mindhunter</i>. FBI agent Holden Ford (Jonathan Groff) is a fictionalized character based on Douglas.</p>
