Friday, October 6th will feature a special tribute to the laying of the University's cornerstone. 



Using Thomas Jefferson's founding of UVA as a starting point, historians weave together the founder's ideas about the role of an educated citizenry in a democracy to discuss who has the ability to shape our country and how this group has changed with time. He is the author and editor of twelve books including The Mind of Thomas Jefferson.

Featuring artifacts from the Albert and Shirley Small Special Collections Library, other University entities, and private collections, The University of Virginia in 100 Objects commemorates UVA's Bicentennial.

The one hundred artifacts included represent moments from two centuries of UVA history in an exhibition that ranges across space as well as time — you can find seventy-nine objects in the galleries of the Harrison Institute/Small Special Collections Library, and twenty-one more may be found at sixteen satellite sites around Grounds.

What are these objects and why were they chosen? They range in size from a pin to a building. Some are symbols of the University's history or the products of intellectual inquiry. They document institutional crises, everyday life, and UVA's place in the Charlottesville community and beyond. From slavery to secret societies, from academics to athletics, from Homer to Hemings to Holsinger, these objects shed light on the people, events, and traditions that shaped the University as we know it today.

This exhibition is based on the book *Mr. Jefferson's Telescope* (UVA Press, 2017), which visitors are encouraged to consult for deeper discussions of each object.

The University of Virginia in 100 Objects is produced by the University of Virginia Library with support from the University of Virginia Bicentennial and funding provided by the Alumni Board of Trustees.

TRIBUTE TO THE LAYING OF THE CORNERSTONE


On October 6, 1817, the cornerstone of the University was laid in place at a ceremony that included three American presidents – Jefferson, Madison, and Monroe. Two hundred years later, the foundation that they put in place for this revolutionary institution of public higher education remains, as it was called in the beginning, "true and trusty."

The Tribute to the Laying of the Cornerstone will feature a Historic Prelude that provides historical context and a sense of Jefferson's vision of the University as an institution that would support democracy, freedom, and happiness for future generations of

Americans. Music by the UVA Chamber Singers. readings, and the presentation of a marble cube and commissioned painting will ground the ceremony in the rich history of the University's founding. The ceremony will also feature perspectives on the past, present, and future of the University from Marcus Martin, the University's Chief **Diversity Officer and Professor** of Emergency Medicine; John T. Casteen, former president and University Professor; and Brvanna Miller. Student Member of the Board of Visitors, and member of the Class of 2018.

Remarks will also be given by Governor Terry McAuliffe, President Teresa A. Sullivan, Bicentennial Commission Chair Robert Battle, Colonnade Club President Jann Balmer, and Rector of the Board of Visitors Frank M. Conner, III.

The highlight of the event will be the presentation of the Bicentennial Marker on the Lawn, which will reaffirm the University's commitment to advance the human experience and ensure the flourishing of democracy. This marker will serve as a lasting physical imprint of the Bicentennial Celebrations as well as a reminder of both the remarkable founding of the University and the University's vision for its third century.

In June 2017, the Board of Visitors approved a design concept and location for the Memorial to Enslaved Laborers at the University of Virginia. The Memorial to Enslaved Laborers, featuring the "Freedom Ring" is designed to commemorate the contributions of enslaved workers. Months of research and public outreach to the UVA community, alumni and Charlottesville-area residents informed the design of the Memorial to Enslaved Laborers. The location for the Memorial will be staked out on location in the triangle of grass east of Brooks Hall. Drawings and a model of the design will be available for viewing, as well as artifacts representing domestic life at the early days of the University. UVA staff and members of the President's Commission on Slavery and the University will be on hand to answer questions.

LESLIE ODOM JR.

Multifaceted performer Leslie Odom, Jr. completed his run on Broadway starring as 'Aaron Burr' in the original cast of the blockbuster hit musical. "Hamilton." a role that earned him the 2016 Tony Award for Lead Actor in a Musical. He is also a Grammy Award-winner as a principal soloist on Hamilton's Original Broadway Cast Recording, which won the 2016 award for Best Musical Theater Album.

Odom, Jr. made his Broadway debut at the age of 17 in Rent, before heading to Carnegie Mellon University's prestigious School of Drama, where he graduated with honors. He is the recipient of a 2002 Princess Grace Award for Acting, which is dedicated to identifying emerging talent in theater, dance and film.

Additional theatre credits include Leap of Faith on Broadway, for which he won the 2012 Astaire Award for Outstanding Male Dancer on Broadway and was nominated for a Drama League Award; the 2014 musical Venice, which also played at The Public Theater; and the Encores! Off-Center production of Tick, Tick... Boom! which was his first time working with Hamilton creator,

On the small screen, Odom, Jr. is best-known for his portraval of 'Sam Strickland' in the NBC musical series, "Smash," and his recurring role as 'Reverend Curtis Scott' on "Law & Order: SVU." He's also appeared in episodes of "Gotham," "Person of Interest," "Grey's Anatomy," "House of Lies," "Vanished" and "CSI: Miami." On the big screen he starred in the 2012 film, "Red Tails," opposite Terrence Howard, Cuba Gooding Jr. and David Oyelowo.

Leslie's debut solo album, "Leslie Odom, Jr." was released in June 2016 on S-Curve Records and quickly rose to number one on the Billboard and iTunes Jazz charts.

Look for him this fall in Kenneth Branagh's reimaging of Agatha Christie's, Murder on the Orient Express featuring an all-star cast including Johnny Depp, Penelope Cruz, Dame Judi Dench and more.

Odom Jr. was raised in Philadelphia, and currently resides in New York City.

The GOO GOO DOLLS have become one of the most globally respected and influential forces in popular music history, selling more than 10 million albums since 1986.

They have had an unprecedented string of 14 Number One and Top Ten multi-format hit singles including "Name," "Slide," "Black Balloon," "Broadway," "Here Is Gone," "Big Machine," "Sympathy," "Stay With You," "Let Love In." "Before It's Too Late," "Jim's Theme (Treasure Planet)," and "Better Days," which, due to its uplifting lyrical spirit, was adopted by CNN as an music bed anthem of sorts for the news channel's Hurricane Katrina recovery coverage. "Iris," from the City Of Angels soundtrack, spent nearly 12 straight months on the

Billboard charts and held the Number One position for 17 consecutive weeks. By that point, sales of the soundtrack exceeded a phenomenal 10 million copies worldwide.

Recently IRIS was also reported by Billboard magazine to be the biggest pop radio song of the last 20 years.

Between the years 1987 and 2015, the band has toured the globe countless times. performed in front of millions of fans, received numerous awards (including four Grammy Award nominations), recorded and released 10 studio albums, a compilation, a live DVD, and Volume One of their Greatest Hits. Volume Two (a box set of rarities, B- sides, demos, videos, and concert performances) was released Summer of 2008. The Goo Goo Dolls, have appeared and

performed on nearly every influential late-night talk show over the course of their career. including twenty performances on The Tonight Show with Jay Leno and nine performances on The Late Late Show with David Letterman to date.

John Rzeznik has been honored with the Songwriters Hall of Fame Hal David Starlight Award and the Goo Goo Dolls have been inducted into Guitar Center's Historic Hollywood Rock Walk.

Joseph Mills holds a BFA in visual art. and an Ed.D in dance education from Temple Univerisity. He is a CMA (Certified Movement Analyst) and has been introducing students to Laban Movement Analysis for the past 15 years. He is also a member of ISMETA (International Somatic Movement Educators and Therapists Association) and conducts classes and private movement sessions designed to help nurture mindful movement practices for individuals and groups. Joseph has been a faculty member of Temple University, a full time faculty member at The George Washington University, a tenured Associate Professor and director

of the dance program at Northwestern University, an Assistant Professor of Dance at Queens College-CUNY in New York, and an an Adjunct Professor of Dance/Movement Therapy at Sarah Lawrence College. Joseph has been a principle dancer with both Mid America Dance Company (now Modern American Dance Company) and MOMIX Dance Theater, and was a principal dancer and rehearsal assistant with the Erick Hawkins Dance Company. He has been a guest artist and choreographer with numerous companies. Over this span of his work with professional companies, Joseph has consistantly performed and choreographed his own

work with presentations in Albania, Italy, Chicago, and the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C. Recent work in New York includes an evening length suite of dances: "Questions About Angels," at Theater for the New City, and an evening of his dances performed by MADCO (Modern American Dance Company) at New York Live Arts. Joseph is currently teaching mindful movement classes at the Northern Dutchess Hospital's Wellness Center, where he is also a fitness trainer. This performance marks the 30th year he has been performing this magnificent work, "Circle Walker."



SUSAN GAETA

Vocalist and guitarist Susan Gaeta is creatively exploring the rich and varied traditions of Sephardic music. She has studied and toured with the legendary Sephardic folk singer/composer Flory Jagoda. Susan is currently a Master Artist in the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities "Master-Apprentice" program where she is dedicated to teaching and preserving Sephardic musical traditions as well as interpreting these beautiful songs for a new generation.

For more than five decades, Maggie Ingram & the Ingramettes brought their music and ministry to congregations in the Tidewater and Piedmont. For "Mama" Maggie Ingram, who sadly passed away on June 23, 2015, music was always a family affair, and three generations were represented in the group. Their commanding, spirit-filled performances demonstrated the extraordinary depth of talent in American gospel music. The family continues on spreading Maggie's joy, ministry, and music. Now led by Maggie's daughter Reverend Almeta Ingram-Miller and her granddaughter Cheryl Maroney Beaver, the group is one of Virginia's premier gospel ensembles.

THE INGRAMETTES







Computer Ensemble) compose, code and perform mobile human-computer music. Founded by professor Matthew Burtner, MICE have been the University of Virginia's resident electroacoustic ensemble since 2001. The group has performed many times at UVA. and also in New York. Washington DC, Chennai, Bangkok, Cape Town, Yokohama, the sand dunes of Namibia, Hong Kong, and in the middle of the Indian and Atlantic Oceans. Germany's Ragazzi Magazine

described MICE as "Curious and striking, inspired and exhilarating." The ensemble's album, "MICE World Tour," was ranked among the top 10 records of 2009 by The WIRE's Susanna Glaser. Their music video, "Sandprints" and "Unity Groove" appeared on the 2014 album "Agents Against Agency". In addition to developing their own live performance pieces, the group has had the pleasure to work with composers such as Phillip Glass, Paula Mathussen, Matmos, Peter Bussigel, Jason Freeman, Sarah O'Halloran, Doug van Nort and others.



SOPRANO

Janice Chandler-Eteme is regarded as one of the world's foremost lyric sopranos. She has appeared as soloist with major orchestras in North America, Europe and Asia. Her career has also been marked by great success in opera, recitals, and sacred music. Critics rave about her "liquid tone" and "emotional depth" as a performer.

CHARLOTTESVILLE SYMPHONY AT THE UNIVERSITY OF VIRGINIA

The orchestra presents 13 Classical, Pops, and Holiday concerts each season, as well as an array of education and outreach programs in performance venues and schools throughout a sixcounty area. The Bear Mountain Dancers are the Monacan Indian Nation's youth dancers who have attended culture classes worked on making their own regalia, and learned the steps for their chosen dance style. They perform regularly at local events and tribal powwows throughout Virginia and beyond.


J. TODD FRAZIER

The University Singers, led by Michael Slon, is the University of Virginia's flagship choral ensemble, performing a cappella and accompanied choral literature including major works with orchestra. Founded in 1957, the group became a primarily student ensemble soon after UVA began admitting women in 1970, and celebrated their 50th anniversary with the 2007-2008 season. In recent years, the group has sung for Les Misérables creators Claude-Michel Schönberg and Alain Boublil, joined with the Charlottesville Symphony for concerts including Beethoven's Symphony no. 9. performed with Bobby McFerrin and for Hillarv Clinton, and sung for the 2016 UVA Holiday greeting which received more than 400.000 views on social media. In 2015, the Singers took a two-week concert tour of England, the Czech Republic,

Poland, and Austria, and recent U.S. tours have taken the group to Atlanta, Boston, Buffalo, Charlotte, Charleston, Chicago, Cincinnati, Nashville, New Orleans, New York City, Orlando, Philadelphia, Providence, Virginia Beach, and the National Cathedral in Washington D.C., as well as the campuses of other American universities for collaborative concerts.


