Reconciliation Road - Join the Journey with VIU (rationale)

The word mark utilizes the VIU institutional font with some subtle modifications to align with the subject including two "i"s symbolizing this is ultimately about people.

The symbol of the compass represents the finding of your way, and also echoes the west coast First Nations artwork look and feel through the use of colour and shapes offering a nod to graphic elements and motifs within the Witness blanket. It can also be interpreted as a sun shining the light of truth, the author of nourishment. It can be viewed as a shield providing protection from harm.

It can also be viewed as a star. All cultures have their own understanding of the stars and no matter where you live or how you make sense of the world, we all look up at night to help us find direction with the knowledge that we all live under the same sky.

The circle can be seen as a healing circle with the four triangles representing the coming together in the spirit of reconciliation and moving forward together. Some may see a flower representing growth and never ending renewal.

Join the Journey with VIU is the descriptor and a call to action. Both the word mark and descriptor would appear on all marketing materials as appropriate. These materials would have a combination of compelling contemporary and historical images as well as quotes from first nations residential school survivors along with the specific information about the offerings.



You're Invited: VIU Offers a Free Workshop Focused on Educating Students on Canada's Residential School History Come See the Witness Blanket and Participate in a Reconciliation Workshop

The Witness Blanket, a nationally recognized and thought-provoking art installation about the impacts of Canada's Residential School Era, is now on display at The View Gallery on Vancouver Island University's Nanaimo campus.

Created by First Nations artist and master carver Carey Newman, The Witness Blanket is a wood-based art installation made up of more than 800 items reclaimed from residential schools, churches, government buildings, and traditional and cultural structures across Canada. The installation, which is more than eight feet tall and 40 feet long, recognizes a darker side of Canada's past, and supports reconciliation. VIU partnered with the Regional District of Nanaimo to bring the installation to Nanaimo. The University hopes it will create opportunities for the community to have conversations about this challenging but critical topic in Canadian history.

In order to engage students in this important piece of work and provide an opportunity for them to learn about the critical process of reconciliation with Canada's Indigenous peoples, VIU is offering a number of opportunities aimed at school groups.

Tour the exhibit: School groups are invited to tour the exhibit at The View Gallery (Building 330 on VIU's Nanaimo campus). The Witness Blanket can be viewed until November 30, 2016 during The View Gallery's normal hours: Tuesday to Saturday, 11 am to 5 pm. Entry is free of charge

Take part in The KAIROS Blanket Exercise, an interactive reconciliation workshop: The KAIROS Blanket Exercise leads students through the history of treaty-making, colonization and resistance, using blankets to represent First Nations peoples living on the lands of what is now called Canada. The workshop has had a powerful and meaningful impact on all who have taken part.

Vancouver Island University would like to acknowledge KAIROS Canada for developing this exercise and providing VIU permission to facilitate these sessions. KAIROS Canada is a joint venture ecumenical program administered by the United Church of Canada.

Representatives from KAIROS Canada will also host a free Facilitator Training Session at Shq'apthut, VIU's Aboriginal Gathering Place on the Nanaimo campus, on Friday, November 25 from 1 - 4 pm for those interested in running workshops themselves. To take the facilitation training, people will need to have participated in the Blanket Exercise at least once.
