Welcome back to campus for Grandparents College! If at any time you need to reach the program director, please call the Grandparents College phone/hotline at 513-839-3626. This number may only be used between 7 a.m. and 10 p.m.

You may also contact Conference Services at 513-330-1717 and that person will put you in touch with the Grandparents College program director.

Campus housing and dining

All Grandparents College participants are staying in Stonebridge Hall on Western Campus. Room assignments and keys will be given to you at Stonebridge Hall at check-in. Please be sure to check out and return your keys during the designated check-out time on Friday, July 19. Please note that a lost key will result in a \$50 fee.

Unless otherwise noted, all on-campus meals will be at Western Dining Commons. Your room key will serve as your meal pass, so please be sure to carry it with you at all times.

Computing resources

Guest internet access is available on campus for anyone with a laptop or mobile device via the wireless network MU-GUEST.

Getting around campus

Walking is the primary mode of transportation during Grandparents College, so be sure to wear good shoes and be prepared to be on time for scheduled classes and activities. Several activities will have group transportation, so please check your daily schedule for the pick-up times.

The designated parking lot for Grandparents College is next to Boyd Hall on Western Campus. Parking is also available for free on campus streets and in designated lots provided you have registered your vehicle with parking services. Do not park in handicap areas unless you have the proper state-issued license plates or placard. Remember, parking meters (including meters along Campus Avenue) require change, and, as always, speed limits will be enforced by local police.

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

Collaborative creature drawings

Stephanie Danker, Assistant Professor of Art Education Shideler Hall 052 | 2:45-3:45 p.m.

Come and create collaborative creature drawings together in this unique class! You will be guided through drawing an imaginary character without seeing the other person's part of the drawings. Each person will leave the class with their own drawing, colored and with a name. This activity is taught in art education on campus every semester as a way to develop character and lead into other forms of collaborative art making, including stop motion animation.

Letterpress printing

Once essential to communication, the 500-year-old process of letterpress printing is thriving as a form of art, craft and design. Learn about physical techniques of printing and typography as well as the people keeping the craft alive. Use vintage fonts and ink to customize and print on historic printing presses in this hands-on class.

How much vitamin C is in our drinks?

What is vitamin C? Where can we find vitamin C? This activity will explore these questions and more as we perform a titration experiment to determine the amount of vitamin C in a variety of favorite beverages. Students will work in a hands-on chemistry lab to prepare samples for testing and summarize their results with a discussion. You might be surprised at what you find in your favorite drinks!

What do you see? The mathematics of patterns and puzzles Dana Cox, Associate Professor, Department of Mathematics Shideler Hall 053 | 4:15-5:15 p.m.

We make predictions all of the time for many different things. While we work on projects, we need a way to judge what we'll need and how big the end result might be. In this course, we will take a look at a few visually different patterns and learn to describe them using mathematics. Come prepared to talk out loud with the group, build intricate designs and have fun! No need for any prior mathematical knowledge or skill.

Rec Center Night Out!

Discover the Raptor Rehabilitation Program where, on average, 50 injured birds of prey are accepted into the program each year and nearly 50% are released back into the wild. Sights to see will be a bald eagle, a golden eagle, rough-legged hawk, owls, turkey vultures and more! Transportation to and from this activity is provided. Take a walk around campus, head to the bookstore for some new Miami gear, visit or just relax in the residence hall! Brick and Ivy Bookstore at Shriver Center is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. You can also venture uptown for a snack and shopping, or use the time to work on your homework!
